Fatal Accident.

On Saturday evening last, an accident occurred, which, we are sorry to say, resulted in the death of Mr. Thomas Kennedy, of the township of Templeton. Mr. Kennedy was proceeding home, after having transacted some business in town, and had got about two miles outside the city, when his horse became affrighted, took flight, and violently precipitated him to the ground, inflicting serious bodily injury. He was brought back to town, and carried to Golden's Hotel, Sussex street, where medical attendance was immediately procured in the persons of Drs. Grant and Sewell, who did all that in their power lay to alleviate his suffering. He expired about four o'clock on Thursday after-

He was conveyed from the scotte of the accident to Mr. Gold in Hotel, Sussex street, where he was deended by Drs.
