

**Thomas Kennedy Fatal Accident 02 January 1862**  
**As reported in the Bytown Tribune and Union newspapers on 04 January 1862**

**Fatal Accident.**

On Saturday evening last, an accident occurred, which, we are sorry to say, resulted in the death of Mr. Thomas Kennedy, of the township of Templeton. Mr. Kennedy was proceeding home, after having transacted some business in town, and had got about two miles outside the city, when his horse became affrighted, took flight, and violently precipitated him to the ground, inflicting serious bodily injury. He was brought back to town, and carried to Golden's Hotel, Sussex street, where medical attendance was immediately procured in the persons of Drs. Grant and Sewell, who did all that in their power lay to alleviate his suffering. He expired about four o'clock on Thursday afternoon.

**RUNAWAY: FATAL ACCIDENT.**—On Saturday evening as Mr. Thomas Kennedy, farmer, of Templeton, was returning home from the city, his horse took fright near McKay's Bay, and he was thrown with considerable force against a large log, which happened to be laying on the road, fracturing all the ribs on the left side and seriously injuring the right breast. He was conveyed from the scene of the accident to Mr. Golden's Hotel, Sussex street, where he was attended by Drs. Grant and Sewell, who rendered him all the assistance in their power, but the injuries were of so severe a character that he gradually sank, and he expired yesterday afternoon at four o'clock.
